

Professional Biography

William C. Terry holds a B.A. in economics and mathematics (*magna cum laude*) from Washington University in St. Louis; an M.S. in Social Science from the California Institute of Technology; and is currently a Ph.D. candidate in political science at the University of California, San Diego (Primary field: American Politics; Secondary Field: Political Methodology). Will has been employed as an analyst at Morgan Stanley in New York; as a research assistant in the Tax Analysis Division of the U.S. Congressional Budget Office in Washington, DC; as an institutional researcher in the President's office at Caltech; and as a research associate at the Peace Research Institute's Centre for the Study of Civil War in Oslo, Norway.

Will is currently writing a dissertation, advised by Gary W. Cox and supported by a *National Science Foundation* doctoral dissertation grant, addressing the political implications of structural changes in voter turnout. The dissertation includes both a theoretical chapter (which contextualizes a number of competing claims in the literature) and three quantitative studies analyzing various aspects of policy change in the U.S. South following the Voting Rights Act of 1965--as a case study of the broader claims about the political consequences of structural changes in the voting regime.

Will's research interests include the relationship between voter participation rates and policy outcomes; political institutions and democratic stability; the politics of salient majority/minority social divisions; statistical analysis; and formal modelling. Will is co-author (with Gary W. Cox) of an article in *Legislative Studies Quarterly* analyzing the determinants of representatives' legislative productivity in the U.S. House of Representatives.
